#### Mr. Rogers in the Neighborhood – City Manager Town Halls

#### **ARPA Funds Public Survey Continues**

The city's public survey through Magellan Strategies continues to gather public input about how to use the city's remaining allotment of ARPA funds and get feedback on the uses that have so far been proposed. The survey opened on Thursday, July 13 and has received 1,381 completed responses from across the city as of July 24. Magellan's initial text message notification period concludes this week, while the survey will remain open via the city website until Aug. 18. #### 2023 Elections

The 2023 municipal election is fast approaching. Nomination petitions to qualify for the ballot will be available for pickup on Tuesday, Aug. 8 at 8 a.m. at the City Clerk's Office. The city is hosting a candidate information session on Aug. 8 at 6 p.m. at the Commerce City Civic Center. While not mandatory, the meeting provides candidates with details on campaign rules and regulations. Information about the city's structure, budget, and current activities also will be provided so candidates have information on current city operations and projects.

Six seats on the City Council are up for election this year, including mayor, council members for Ward II, Ward III, and Ward IV, as well as two individuals to represent the city At Large. All seats will serve four-year terms, with the exception of the Ward III seat, which is being elected for a special two-year term.

They will help define Commerce City's key messages for business, create a marketing plan and provide a marketing tool-kit with best practices and tactical ideas for communicating the city's business and economic development advantages.

#### **Business Attraction**

- A representative from Napa Auto Parts informed staff that the retailer will open a new store near the intersection of E. 104th Avenue and Tower Road. The retailer is working on completing the building's interior finish including the instillation of a fire suppression system
- · Staff met with a restauranteur to discuss opening a new

full-service restaurant concept in the northern range. Dinner and breakfast concepts were the focus of the discussion. Staff provided a detailed overview of the market demographics and assistance programs designed to attract new investments and expedite the development process.

- Staff responded to an inquiry from a real estate broker representing a full-service restaurant franchise owner. The owner will be touring potential restaurant sites next week for a planned expansion in the metro Denver area. Staff provided the broker with site opportunities, market information and details for the northern range. Staff also extended an invitation to meet on site to respond directly to any questions and provide additional data points.
- Staff connected with a representative for an International hotel brand that is in the very early stages of exploring a potential new hotel with a property owner in Commerce City. The city currently has one hotel under construction and two more in the planning process.
- Staff extended a third courtesy call to the broker representing Project Minecraft to answer questions, provide additional data points or respond to any concerns in the potential sites submitted to the broker.
- Staff contacted 10+ national restaurant brands and local restaurant concept groups to present site opportunities in the northern range. These efforts resulted in two site visits that include a local restaurant concept and national restaurant chain.

## Community Appearance/Clean Ups

#### **Community Updates**

Work on the school traffic calming project began on July 17 at Rose Hill Elementary and is planned to be complete by July 28. To date, 10.5 out of 16 schools have been completed.

Public Works coordinated with Parks, Recreation, and Golf staff on the selection committee to choose a CM/GC for the Buffalo Run Golf Course. 11 responses to the RFQ were reviewed and three finalists were selected for interviews. Public Works toured the Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge (RMANWR) with representatives from the RMANWR to better understand their operations and groundwater treatment processes.

Parks Staff mowed the new 90-acre future school/park site at E. 96<sup>th</sup> Avenue and Reunion Parkway. Parks staff spent extra time this week at Fronterra Park cleaning up the park amenities as someone went around and painted graffiti throughout the park.

### Infrastructure

#### Parks:

- Routine daily operations include maintenance, general cleanup/trash removal, vandalism repairs/graffiti removal, weed control, servicing of shelter and facility rentals, ballfield maintenance, irrigation maintenance, and mowing.
- Staff continued to work extra hours working on irrigation systems throughout the parks and City buildings this week due to the hot and dry weather.
- Staff continued mowing the perimeter of open space areas, future school/park sites, and trails throughout the city.
- Staff began to install new rules and regulations signs along Sand Creek Trail this week.

#### Streets:

- Routine daily operations include pavement/road maintenance (pothole patching, shoulder maintenance, grading, etc.), street sweeping, rightof-way mowing and weed control, traffic sign maintenance and replacements, responses to SeeClickFix tickets on a wide variety of reported issues, and cleanup of illegal dumping.
- Began school speed table installation. About 60% of staff diverted from normal weekly work to assist in the completion of this project.
- 3 speed tables installed on average per day.
- Right of Way Crew:
  - Moving operations continue.
  - · South properties complete.
  - Contractor: Highway 2 approximately 90% complete
- Stormwater:
  - Performed routine maintenance of storm basins along E. 96<sup>th</sup> Avenue near Second Creek
- Sweeping Program
  - · Completed Route 5, Pass 2
  - Hauled 12 loads to dump

#### Facilities:

- Routine daily operations include maintenance and repair of all city facilities.
- Staff has been working on SeeClickFix items assigned to the Facilities Team.
- Staff is responding to temperature controls calls throughout the city.

#### Fleet:

- Routine daily operations include: Fleet Technicians complete scheduled and unscheduled repairs, snow operations support, and preventive maintenance.

## Parks, Recreation and Golf


#### Police Camp: July 17 -20 in Granby, CO

#### We see you Downtown Derby!

The community known as Derby was formed in the 1880's to support the newly constructed Derby Burlington Northern Railroad Station. Following World War II, a quaint commercial town center emerged in a pattern that is largely intact today at the intersection of Highway 2 and E.72nd Avenue. During its prominence, Downtown Derby was an important part of many resident's daily lives with a grocery store, bowling alley, roller skating rink, multiple restaurants, a variety of retail stores, and personal services to meet the needs of the community.



The Community desires for Downtown Derby to once again become a community activity center, as it was decades ago. A place where residents can shop, dine, dwell, and seek consistent entertainment. Through it's Urban Renewal Authority, the City of Commerce City has begun planning efforts to revitalize Derby. An extensive community engagement process is anticipated to kick-off in the first half of 2024 to gain valuable feedback for the vision of Derby from the community, property owners, and business owners.

In the meantime, the City's Urban Renewal Authority has begun to implement the Derby Master Sign Plan to prominently market the location and brand to passersby.
