THE CONSOLIDATED PLAN

The Consolidated Plan:

- Identifies and prioritizes community development and housing needs
- Develops a 5-year strategy to target \$2.1M in federal grant funds to areas with greatest needs

The Annual Action Plan:

 Serves as funding application for HUD's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program

An evaluation report (called the **CAPER**) is produced at the close of each program year





PROGRAM CHANGES

HOME CONSORTIUM

- Commerce City will join the Adams County HOME Consortium October 1, 2022
- Allows City to access a new source of funding for affordable housing
- This is also discussed in the ConPlan



SECTION 108 LOAN PROGRAM

- Allows the City to borrow against future years' CDBG allocations to make a large investment in a CDBG activity.
- Borrowing capacity is 5x the City's annual grant amount (approx. \$2.1 million)
- Typically used to fill a gap in the financing for larger development projects.
- Often provides the security necessary to catalyze investment from private lenders.
- As with the CDBG Program, all projects and activities must meet one of the CDBG Program's three national objectives:
 - Benefit low- and moderate-income persons
 - Aid in the elimination or prevention of slums or blight
 - Meet urgent needs of the community



BROADBAND & RESILIENCY

- New CDBG Regulations Require 2018-and-later
 Consolidated Plans to consider Broadband Needs and
 Resilience to Natural Hazards.
- Requires new stakeholder consultations:
 - Broadband service providers
 - Organizations engaged in narrowing the digital divide
 - Flood and water resources management professionals
 - Emergency management agencies
- Review of broadband coverage maps and hazard mitigation plans
- These plan elements are incorporated into the Market Analysis component of the Plan.
