




### Westminster Rotary Club


Your Funding in 2021 of \$6,000 helps us to provide 487 books this month to kids in Commerce City, with 170 graduated within the last 12 months.

**Statistics:** Access to Books Is the Key to Successful Reading Development

## 61% Have No Books

Sixty-one percent of lowincome families have no books at all in their homes for their children.

While low-income childrenhave, onaverage, four children's booksin their homes, a team of researchers concluded that nearly two thirds of the low-income families they studied owned no books for their children. (Children's Literary Foundation, 2021).



Children in low-income families lack essential one-on-one reading time.

The average child growing up in a middle-class family has been exposed to <u>1,000 to 1,700</u>hours of one-on-one picture book reading. The average child growing up in a less economically stable family, in contrast, has only been exposed to <u>25</u> hours of one-on-one reading. (McQuillan).



The most successful way to improve the reading achievement of low-income children is to increase their access to print.

Communities ranking high in achievement tests have several factors in common: an abundance of books in public libraries, easy access to books in the community at large, and a large number of textbooks per student(Newman et al.). The only behavior measure that correlates significantly with reading scores is the number of books in the home.

An analysis of a national data set of nearly 100,000 United States school children found that access to printed materials and not poverty—is the "critical variable affecting reading acquisition" (J. McQuillan, Literacy Crises: False Claims and Real Solution).

### 2020-2021 Survey Summary

- 60% of children signing up are from families new to Imagination Library
- 50% have less than 20 books in their house
- 50% read to their kids before enrolling in Imagination Library
- 85% read to their children after enrolling in Imagination Library
- 40% of the children ask to be read to before enrolling in Imagination Library
- 70% of the children ask to be read to after enrolling in Imagination Library
- 30% read alone less than 3 times a week before enrolling in Imagination Library
- 77% read alone more often than before enrolling in Imagination Library
- 60% of older siblings are reading more after enrolling in Imagination Library
