Background

- Colorado voters approved Proposition 122 in November 2022
 - Decriminalized five psychedelics (psilocybin, psilocin, dimethyltryptamine, ibogaine, and mescaline)
 - Required State to enact licensing scheme by late 2024
 - Prohibited Locals from banning facilities, services, and use
 - Allows Locals to regulate time, place, and manner of facilities



Background

- Governor Polis signed Senate Bill 23-290 in May 2023
 - Department of Regulatory Affairs (DORA) to regulate licensing of facilitators and services
 - Department of Revenue to regulate licensed facilities and owners/employees
 - Creates State Licensing Authority and establishes license types
 - DORA rulemaking process since May 2023
 - Licensing begins no later than December 31, 2024



Natural Medicine Overview

- Defined as psilocybin, psilocin, dimethyltryptamine (DMT), ibogaine, and mescaline
- Usage dates back thousands of years to Spain, Argentina, and Mexico
- Religious and ritual ceremonies
- Study by Johns Hopkins shows symptoms of anxiety and depression "significantly relieved" in cancer patients and veterans with PTSD
- Alternative to daily medications of SSRIs, anti-depressants, and other mental health medications with studies showing higher effects



Natural Medicine Overview

- Person 21+ can be a licensed "Facilitator"
 - Requirements for obtaining license set by DORA
 - Administer natural medicine services to person 21+ "participant"
 - Must conduct a safety screening prior to administration session
 - Administration session is administered at a Healing Center
 - Integration session conducted to maximize benefits of Administration session
- Healing Center
 - Location where Facilitator and participant conduct sessions
 - Natural medicines do not leave Healing Centers
 - Participants must have a discharge plan or transportation arranged



Natural Medicine Overview

- Other license types and facility types:
 - Clinical facilitator facilitator also possess another license for diagnosis and treatment of behavioral/mental health and physical health conditions
 - Distinguished Educator individuals licensed in other jurisdictions or have extensive professional achievement in natural medicine
 - Training licensee individual training for Facilitator or Clinical facilitator
 - Cultivation license natural medicine grown, harvested, and processed
 - Manufacturing license manufacturers natural medicine into products
 - Testing performs testing and research on natural medicine products



Role of Local Jurisdictions

- Cannot prohibit natural medicine centers or administration of natural medicine
- Cannot adopt "unreasonable" regulations
- Can regulate time, place, and manner
- Land development code regulates place and manner
- Municipal code regulates time



Staff Recommendations

Place

- CRS 44-50-302 prohibits Healing Centers within 1000ft of a childcare center, preschool, elementary, middle, or high school but Local can remove/reduce
- Staff recommends amending LDC to add Healing Centers similar to medical offices, dental offices, substance abuse treatment facilities, etc. in C-1, C-2, C-3, MU-1, and I-1
- Staff recommends amending LDC to add Natural Medicine Cultivation,
 Manufacturer, and Testing similar to marijuana licenses of the same type in I-1, I-1S, I-2, and I-3

Time

Staff recommends amending Code to limit hours from 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM
