2014 Legislative Goals

- Develop strong working relationships with Commerce City delegation
- Articulate policy positions adopted by City Council
- Advocate support/opposition to legislation that affected Commerce City
- Strategic engagement year-round, not just during session



Council Legislative Committee

• Role: Anticipate and proactively address federal, state and regional legislation/policies to protect the city's home rule charter

• Responsibilities:

- Help draft state and federal policy statements
- A member shall also be city representative on CML policy committee
- Review pending legislation, including pros/cons
- Confirm city positions against policy statements
- Be available to testify to advance city positions



Council Legislative Committee

- Staff reviewed and identified legislation to monitor consistent with approved policy statement.
- Legislative subcommittee met weekly to review monitored legislation
 - Received tracking sheet with full legislative text and status
- Meetings reviewed pros, cons and staff recommended position
- Subcommittee discussion either confirms action based on policy statement or recommends full council action/discussion at regular meeting
- Approve testimony on behalf of city

Legislative Program Updates

- Held first legislative reception
- Created policy positions booklet to mirror federal advocacy booklet
- Created staff legislative subcommittee
- Coordinated/drafted testimony
- Weekly reporting

- Regular participant with Colorado Municipal League meetings
- Participated in Metro North Chamber of Commerce BGA committee
- Partnered with Broomfield and Parker to secure issue-specific lobbyist

69th General Assembly

- 120 days (Jan. 7 May 7)
- Democrats control Governor's Office, House
 (+6) and Senate (+1)
- 621 bills introduced
- 92 bills tracked by the city
 - Actively supported two bills
 - Actively opposed four bills



Legislative Results

- Active Support
 - HB 1164, Elections Law Changes: passed
 - SB 220, Owner Occupied Construction Defects:
 passed committee, procedurally failed



Legislative Results

- Active Opposition
 - SB 181, Red Light Cameras: postponed indefinitely
 - SB 017, State Pre-emption of Local Development: modified to a interim study committee (dropped opposition)
 - HB 1061, eliminating jail to pay fines: modified to address most of administrative issues (dropped opposition)
 - HB 1375, urban renewal: amended to extend effective date, clarifying amendments on applicability. Awaiting governor signature
