Staff attended the ICSC Las Vegas conference, the world's largest commercial real estate gathering in Las Vegas, Nevada. This year, content sessions at the conference highlighted trends and challenges facing the industry. Conference sessions included *Urban and Suburban Renewal Strategies: Lessons from Successful Revitalization Projects* and *Shifting Store Formats: The Impact on Tenant Mixes, Leases and Portfolio.* Staff heard from ICSC Las Vegas keynote speaker and seven-time National Coach of the Year Nick Saban on overcoming adversity. CCPD Launches New Program to Generate Community Feedback

The Commerce City Police Department is excited to launch a new software that will allow us to collect near-immediate feedback from community members who we have interacted with as the result of a 911 call.

PowerEngage is a citizen engagement software, and here's how it works: after contacting 911 you will immediately begin receiving text message updates including pre-arrival instructions, your incident number, and the officer's arrival time.

Six hours after we've closed out your 911 call, you will receive a text message requesting you complete a two-question survey. It will take just a couple of seconds, and the questions are designed to gauge how you felt about the service you received from the Commerce City Police Department and the actual officer who handled your call.



Whether positive or negative, we want your honest opinion. The information is essential in ensuring we are addressing problems and also commending good work. We will additionally be broadcasting some of the responses on a screen in our briefing room so that officers can see the results as well.

Although we certainly hope you will, if you would rather not participate in the survey, simply ignore the text message. The automated messages will not be sent out between the hours of 6 p.m. and 8 a.m., so your window to receive them will exceed six hours in some cases.

PW Updates

Preservation and Safety

In cooperation with the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) inspectors, Engineering staff completed a safety audit of traffic signage and striping along the Railroad Quiet Zones in the City. Striping enhancements at several intersections were recommended out of this audit. Staff will be completing these enhancements in the next few weeks.

Engineering

- Staff attended the Win-Win Coalition meeting. The coalition is organized by the Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge (RMANWR) and representatives from various organizations and agencies around the RMANWR attend to provide updates about projects they are working on. Representatives from Denver Parks, Denver Transportation, Mile High Flood District, Denver International Airport, Aurora, and Adams County typically attend.
- Staff attended a Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) meeting for the I-270 improvement project to discuss the presentation to City Council for an update about the project planned for the June 3 City Council meeting.
- Staff participated in an update meeting for the Tower Road Signal Retiming project (from E. 104th Avenue to Colfax). This project will involve participation of Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) staff, Denver and Aurora and will provide a signal timing coordination plan to move traffic more effectively along the corridor.
- A weekly meeting was conducted for the E. 120th Avenue Widening project between Chambers Road and Buckley Road.
 The project is being advertised for bids with the bid opening scheduled for May 29.
- Staff attended a Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) meeting for the Vasquez Improvements project.
- Staff attended an on-site construction meeting for the Colorado Boulevard paving and multi-model improvement project.

Parks

- As we gear up for the warmer season, staff has began running irrigation on parks throughout Commerce City. Sites included Bison Ridge Recreation Center, Turnberry Park, River Run Park and Fronterra Park.
- Weed removal operations were successfully carried out at Bison Ridge Recreation Center, while herbicide and pest control measures have been ongoing to maintain the parks' pristine condition.
- Additionally, pesticide applications were conducted to address ant and insect populations in various Trails and Open Space sites such as River Run Park and Freedom Park.
- Ballfield maintenance activities were also in full swing at Second Creek Elementary, Turnberry Park, and Pioneer Park to provide safe and enjoyable recreational spaces for all.
- Furthermore, a missing stone at the Veterans Memorial retaining wall has been repaired, ensuring the park's integrity and aesthetics. Thank you for your continued support as we strive to make our parks beautiful and inviting for all to enjoy.



Streets

- This week, traffic teams replaced and updated railroad signage from E. 72nd Avenue and Highway 2 to E. 104th Avenue and Highway 2. A total of 20 signs were updated along that route for federal inspection.
- Traffic teams continued pavement marking and striping enhancements to Chambers, north of 104th Avenue, in efforts to help drivers navigate lane and turn movements in the area.
- Pavement teams were hard at work this week with a total of 204 repairs.
- Pavement teams also repaired 4 speed humps along Buffalo Run Drive using 32 tons of hot mix asphalt. Teams used 1 ton of hot mix asphalt to repair the shoulder at 120th Avenue and Buckley Road.
- In preparation for the Memorial Day Parade on May 27, sweeping teams began sweeping on the parade route.
