Subject: Quality Community Foundation Nonprofit Grant Program

Date: March 12, 2018

Purpose

The purpose of this memo is to provide city council with information on the Quality Community Foundation's annual non-profit grant program, including the results of the 2018 solicitation. Nonprofits awardees will be recognized at the March 19 city council meeting.

Foundation Background

In 2003, City Council formed the Non-City Agency Grant Program to financially contribute to non-profit organizations that augment City services and render assistance to Commerce City residents. After the program gained momentum, and in an effort to avoid perceived conflict of interests among council members, the Quality Community Foundation (QCF) was established as a nonprofit in 2006 for charitable purposes.

The Quality Community Foundation's mission is to improve the quality of life for Commerce City residents by serving people and agencies. The foundation achieves its mission through the following objectives:

- Attracting charitable gifts and promoting community philanthropy;
- Serving as a steward for entrusted funds to support city programs and the programs and activities of economic, educational, social, and cultural non-profit organizations;
- Enhancing the effectiveness of the non-profit community, and
- Being a community resource and providing services to individuals, non-profit agencies, and the community-at-large.

Currently, the Foundation operates three programs to implement these objectives:

- Nonprofit grant program, funding for which is annually appropriated by city council
- Post-secondary scholarship program, funding for which is raised by the annual QCF golf tournament and annual city council appropriations
- Youth recreation scholarships, funding for which is raised by the annual QCF Wine & Beer Tasting event







Up to 11 members are appointed by city council and the city manager's designee (currently the director of finance) serves on the board as treasurer. The Foundation receives dedicated staff support from the community liaison in the city manager's office.

Nonprofit Grant Program

The Foundation's board of directors annually refines the grant program based on feedback from applicants and city council. Since 2014, the number of requests has exceeded available funding as noted in Table 1.

Applicants generally must meet the following:

- Organizations must be a 501(c)3 nonprofit in good standing with state and federal regulations
- Grant activities must benefit Commerce City residents
- Successful grantees will:
 - o Clearly explain and use data to demonstrate a compelling community need
 - Describe how their organization will address the need, including how they measure progress and/or success
 - Have a board-approved statement that prohibits discrimination based on race, color, religion, gender, age, national origin, disability, marital status, sexual orientation or military status.

The grant, eligibility, and selection criteria requirements are published two months prior to the submittal deadline. Technical assistance meetings also are held to support nonprofit submittals. The maximum award amount a nonprofit can receive is \$7,500 – in an effort to achieve objective of serving as a community resource and ensuring a broad array of services.

Previous applicants also must submit a grant report from the prior year detailing how funding was spent and verifying the number of residents served to be eligible for funding. The board analyzes the reports, using this information as a funding criterion for evaluation.





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Meaningful Community Impact

Based on annual reporting from funded organizations, the number of organizations awarded and residents benefited are broken down by category as noted in Tables 2 and 3.



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2018 Grant Process

The 2018 grant process kicked off December 11, 2017. Local nonprofits were able to apply through February 2, 2018. Applications were offered through the city website and applicants had an opportunity for technical assistance, proposal discussions, and questions during meetings January 10 and 13, 2018. The staff liaison also was available to assist with incoming questions via telephone or email.

After receiving all submissions, board members reviewed funding requests and scored each application based on the established criteria. A quorum of board members met to discuss the scoring and application information. The 2018 grant cycle was a competitive process; the Board decided not to fund three applicants: Commerce City Rotary Foundation, Fraternal Order of the Eagles, and Little Giants Learning Center. Final decisions on the 2018 grant awards are noted in Table 4.

Future Programming

The Quality Community Foundation sees a need and desire within the local nonprofit community for grant writing technical support and workshops, which will help build the capacity of these organizations well into the future. The Foundation Board will use remaining funds from this year's budget to provide grant-writing class opportunities for small and local nonprofits that will not only benefit future Foundation requests but help local nonprofits expand funding sources.

The Board also looks forward to meeting with City Council in the future to discuss how the Foundation can better align with stated goals and the vision for the city.
