This document assists the CDBG Team in analyzing and scoring each project submitted for grant funding. The primary ranking criteria are listed below. Further down are examples of questions to ask to assist your scoring decisions.

2.	Overall benefit or impact on the community	40 Points
3.	Agency experience and ability	40 Points
4.	Benefit to low- to moderate-income residents	40 Points
5.	Supplementary funding and leveraging capabilities	20 Points
6.	Is the Project in an Adopted Plan?	10 Points

Criterion 3 - Agency Experience and Ability: 40 points

- Qualified project manager assigned (experience)
- Applicant can meet reporting requirements
- Applicant has capacity to complete the project
- Has met external approvals (zoning, annexation, permits, inspections...)
- □ Financial Stability-does the applicant have financial capability to cover expenses for the project while awaiting CDBG reimbursements?
- Applicant has experience with Federal, State and local grants
- Number of prior years the applicant has requested funds for operating expenses
- Has received and successfully implemented prior CDBG projects
- Had documented financial records
- Adequate funding sources identified for project completion
- Has experience in the community

Criterion 4 - Benefit to Low- to Moderate- Income Residents: 40 points

- Primarily Benefits low/moderate income families
- Project impact on the L/M income residents in the City
- Project location is in Target Area

<u>Criterion 5 – Committed Supplementary Funding and Leveraging</u> Capabilities: 20 points

- Percentage amount of funds leveraged with other sources
- Timeliness of leveraged funds
- Applicant's history of receipt of leverages funds
- Description and amount of in-kind leveraging provided
- Proof or documentation of leveraged funds

Criterion 6 - Is the Project in an Adopted Commerce City Plan?: 10
