


AGING IN THE REGION AND THE STATE

Colorado: Population Growth Percent change by Age: 2000 – 2016








60-plus Population Forecasted Percent Growth (2016-2050)






75-plus Population Forecasted Percent Growth (2016-2050)






Commerce City – Total Population + Yearly Growth Rate






Commerce City – 60 plus & 75 plus percent of population





Commerce City – 60 plus total population and growth rate











Our motivation: Need for multi-pronged approach





DRCOG's Boomer Bond – Key Elements

- A comprehensive inventory to assist with the future development of policies, plans and strategies

Why an Assessment Tool?

- "Conversation starter" at the local level (including partners)
- Provide structure to what can be an overwhelming conversation
- Help focus efforts to engage the general public





Development History:

- Initially developed by group of ~60 stakeholders
- Intentionally created an instrument geared toward local government staff
- "Beta-tested" by 3 communities in Denver region


A Few General Observations:

- Assessment must be locally owned
- Important to identify past and current successes not just current and future needs
- DRCOG is not taking "score" our role(s):
 - Process design
 - Community connector
 - Resource and facilitation support (if needed)

Boomer Bond Assessment Tool – Topic Areas




Process typically takes 4-6 months to complete
