AN ORDINANCE REZONING THE PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN EXHIBIT "A" ATTACHED HERETO AND MADE A PART HEREOF, LOCATED AT 6440 EAST 64TH AVENUE, COMMERCE CITY, COLORADO, AND AMENDING THE ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF COMMERCE CITY, COLORADO TO REFLECT SAID REZONING.

Summary and Background Information:

The subject property is approximately 15,074 square-feet and is currently zoned R-3. The site is south of E. 64 th Avenue and is in close proximity to Monaco Street. The proposed zone change to the R-4 zone district and requested subdivision plat would allow for owner occupied townhouses as proposed by the applicant in the submitted development plan (D-262-15). Currently, the subject property is vacant and is adjacent to a church and other multi-family residential uses. A concurrent subdivision plat has been submitted to create 6 lots on the subject property. The future land use for the subject property is high-density residential. The requested R-4 zone district aligns with the Comprehensive Plan designation.

Based on feedback from the Planning Commission, the applicant has submitted a revised site development plan incorporating changes that address concerns of the Planning Commission. The revised site plan and has been included along with a memo explaining the changes made.
