Revitalization

Since 2005, the city has implemented several programs to support redevelopment in Derby in order to strengthen the business community with new shops, restaurants and other services while also supporting the growth of existing businesses. A combination of grant funding and private investment has contributed to these efforts.

Derby Downtown District

The historic <u>Derby Downtown District</u> is an important part of Commerce City's identity – both past and future. Longtime residents recall its heyday as a bustling activity center during the 1950s and 1960s, while current residents and business owners see its vast potential to once again become an important community hub. Revitalizing the district, re-establishing it as a destination and enhancing its visibility are just some of the goals of the Derby Master Plan as envisioned by the <u>Commerce City Urban Renewal Authority</u>.

Lighting and Signage Plan

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In 2018, the city approved a plan to upgrade both street lighting and signage elements in the Derby Downtown District. Improved lighting will make the district safer and more welcoming, wayfinding signage will help direct visitors to destinations in Derby, and both will contribute to the area's unique identity within Commerce City. The city is currently exploring various funding opportunities in order to implement recommendations in the plan, which will likely take place in phases as funding becomes available.



GOAL ONE

Respond to the Needs and Findings of the Community and the City - as expressed in numerous meetings with business and landowners and the Derby Community in general, and as expressed in the 2006 Community Needs Survey.

GOAL TWO

Re-establish Derby as a Destination, through:

- Elegant and cohesive landscaping, appealing to all the senses
- A friendlier pedestrian environment
- 24/7 activity

GOAL THREE

To Give Derby Greater Visibility and Identity:

- Build on existing strengths of infrastructure and Derby's community
- Entrance icons
- Better definition of edge
- Better definition of core, as the center and focus of Derby, and an event focus for markets, fairs, stages etc.. The existing mature trees, planted with foresight are to be kept
- Consistent and compatible signage, lighting and landscaping GOAL FOUR

Use the 1950s Era as a Unifying Architectural Foundation, for greater identity, while still encouraging buildings to be an expression of time, user, and function.

GOAL FIVE

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Revitalize Derby:

- Re-establish its social, economic, environmental well-being,
- Greater building density
- Increased building heights
- Greater variety of land use
- Stimulation of a greater business market, and variety of uses and users 24/7
- Encourage greater environmental awareness in planning and design.

 Encourage multi-functional use of individual spaces to ensure a variety of uses at different times.

GOAL SIX

Become an Environmental Model:

- Derby is part of an ecological, economic, and cultural system at all scales.
- Derby needs more flow, dynamism, connections, variety, and opportunities for cross-pollination throughout.
- Environmental design will be strongly encouraged to allow long term benefits and economic efficiencies.

GOAL SEVEN

Transform Derby into a more Healthy and Multi-Modal Traffic Environment, while continuing to support the importance of the automobile:

- · Elegant and cohesive landscaping, lighting, and way-finding signage
- Wider sidewalks near buildings
- Better pedestrian connections to community assets (such as Library, Rancho Liborio, Prairie Gateway, Hanson Elementary School and future schools, Community Center, daytime employment, Highway #2 traffic from Northern Range)
- Human scale facades with eyes on the street
- Street furniture
- Places to sit and meet
- Traffic calming
- · Planning for public transportation
- Pedestrian and bike friendly environment
- Greater sense of safety and community.

GOAL EIGHT

Develop models for change:

 Construct early phases of revitalization to establish pattern for longterm evolution.

Catalyst Program (add statistics on program)

The *Commercial Catalyst Program* is designed to encourage business and property owners to update building facades, signage and landscaping within the Derby District.

Program Eligibility

• The program is open to property owners, business owners and/or tenants

Eligible Activities

- Exterior painting
- Awnings
- Exterior lighting
- Window replacements and treatments



The City <u>requires</u> all new signage in the Derby Sub-Area to conform to the signage regulations and; that landscaping adhere to the approved landscape regulations and materials within the Derby District PUD and Design Standards.

- Increase safety, access and mobility



Staff Actions & Recommendations

Current/Short-term [0-6 months]

- Compete business survey
- Complete market study
- Host events & festivals**
- Evaluate opportunities for strategic investments (land acquisition, public improvements)**
- Continue marketing and improvement efforts in cooperation w/business owners**
- Launched Hispanic Heritage Celebration with community partners
- Partnered with Adelante Community Development to use the Small Business Resource Center (SBRC) for entrepreneurship and small business training
- Small Business Needs Assessment Survey
- Partnered with the Police Department to launch the Derby Cop Shop inside the Small Business Resource Center (SBRC)

Mid-term [6 – 24 months]

- Refresh/update the Derby Sub-area Plan & Design Guidelines
- Construct necessary public infrastructure repair & replacement
- Identify/assist in attracting a diverse mix of businesses and private investment
- Explore a distinct zoning category for Derby in the Updated Land Development Code

Long-term [24 months +]

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
- Evaluate and adjust Master Plan elements for effectiveness
